Florida Gun Law and Education

At the club's June meetings James D. Phillips, a Florida lawyer gave a presentation on Florida gun laws. He has defended self-defense cases and is knowledgeable in the laws and rights of law-abiding gun owners. Owning and using a firearm is serious and we all need to know what we can and can't do in defending our lives.

December 2022 ATF Form 4473

All of us buying a firearm from a gun dealer or

transferring via an FFL must fill out the ATF form 4473 followed by



a background check. In December 2022 the ATF revised that form to include a couple of additional questions related to "Straw Purchases" or guns purchased for another person, which went into use in April 2023.

The questions are very complicated and obviously written by lawyers, so be aware of this during your next purchase.

Of course, this is typical of your overreaching unelected bureaucratic government. Instead of prosecuting the people illegally purchasing firearms, the ATF is making it more difficult for us to legally purchasing firearms. 

America's First Aerial Gunners

WW1 had the first widespread use of aircraft in warfare and the United States needed to train its airmen on how to use guns on fighter aircraft. Totally different shooting compared to the mounted cavalry shooting that the Army was familiar with.

Also, the use of shotguns was common in this new form of warfare and skeet shooting was used in

training. Of course, the target was WW1 aircraft that were mostly made of a tubular framework with a cloth covering, had no armor plating to protect the pilot and critical parts of the aircraft.

Even today's fighter pilots can improve their gun accuracy by taking up skeet shooting.

Smith & Wesson Model 350 X-Frame

Some of us jumped on board with an AR-15 350 Legend upper for a little more energy over the 5.56 mm standard. Well now Smith and Wesson modified its heavy X-Frame revolver for that cartridge.

What is interesting is that the 350 Legend can be compared to the Remington 357 Maximum (not Magnum) cartridge that was previously



developed, the 350 Legend is a slightly longer case and a rimless version of the 357 Maximum.

So, Smith and Wesson adapted this 5.56 based cartridge into a handgun that's one of the most powerful .357 caliber cartridges. Since this cartridge is based on a 5.56 case and a .357 bullet style the production cost of this ammo is reasonable. It's rimless so moon clicks are needed to keep the cartridge in place in the cylinder on the Model 350 X.

"ALL HAIL THE FANNY PACK!"

I think it's time to admit that I must be a bit of a dork at heart. That's because I've re-discovered that sexy, blast-from-the-past-fashion statement known as the "fanny pack". Admittedly, at my lithe 240 pounds, I'm not exactly a clothes horse and am in no way a threat to become the next spokes-model for the Big & Tall clothing industry. No, this is totally a gun-related issue that has nothing to do with carrying a pair of sunglasses and over-stuffed wallet in a questionable accessory.

All this strategic, garment problem-solving is made much easier during the cooler weather, when layers of clothing more easily conceal your carry guns. But, as the Florida sunshine starts to broil your brain, you're reminded that it's now necessary to wear as little as is legally possible. Doing so while still carrying a hidden firearm is no mean trick! So, instead of trying to stuff a Kydex holster down your already too-tight cargo shorts, try turning, once again, to the good old fanny pack. The advantages will easily outweigh any worry over Village residents considering you a tasteless 80's reject. (Anyway, have you SEEN some of the outfits cobbled together around here?!) You have absolutely nothing to worry about.

Another advantage is being able to slip the fanny pack off and stow it in your vehicle if you need to enter a no-gun area, without the need of unbuckling a pant-belt. Although any fanny pack that fits your carry gun will do, a number of firearm manufacturers make a specialty item (read more expensive) that might better fit the bill. These often have built-in holsters and break-away fronts that can be pulled open for very quick access. (Personally, I'm not a fan of these and end up cutting off the pull-straps as they just get in the way. The extra fraction of a second it takes to open the fanny pack with a zipper is, for me, not much of a concern.) Whatever the configuration, you must practice your draw (without ammo) over and over until it becomes second nature. These items also often have space for an extra magazine (always a good idea). As a side note: The belts that come with the fanny packs are much flimsier than a proper gun belt and can sag annoyingly under the weight of a firearm. I've solved that problem by cutting off the supplied belt and threading the fanny pack through my gun belt. The only downside is that taking the thing on and off is a bit more of a pain.

You could add to the deception by sewing on a university or pro-football team patch to help confuse the masses. Having NRA



identification or other gun-related patches is a dead giveaway to what you've got in there. Also, choosing a color other than tactical black or flatdark-earth might be an idea worth considering.

The gun industry has expanded on the fanny pack idea with all sorts of carriers, including welldisguised cell-phone haulers that have enough space for a micro gun and mag combo. Search around the Internet and you'll discover lots of new ways to carry. But it's hard to beat the original. All hail the fanny pack!

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
